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an update from Greening Rosewater Loop

A view from PortBUG

The Port Adelaide Bicycle User Group (PortBUG) has promoted the Rosewater Loop and closely related Gillman Rail Yard pathway since conducting an 'on the ground' survey in 2014 with Ottoway residents to explore community use of several local disused rail corridors. These included the informal 'made' pathways in the old Gillman rail yards and the disused Rosewater Loop rail line.

We subsequently requested that a connected, shared-use pathway comprising a repurposed Rosewater Loop corridor combined with a formalised east-west pathway through the Gillman Rail Yards be incorporated into the PAE Bike Plan (now Council's 'Walking & Cycling Plan'). PortBUG then worked with Council to develop recommendations for construction of the Rosewater Loop with a focus on safety, community access and effective connection to key destinations along the way.

The resulting overall 'circuit' would provide transport-isolated Rosewater and Ottoway residents with muchneeded high-quality walking and cycling connections to shopping, service and community centres, rail interchanges and to the Port CBD and Outer Harbor Greenway (OHG). Development of both pathways would also provide longer-term opportunities for establishing invaluable 'greenspace', as well as secure access to existing and new recreational facilities, particularly for younger folk.

We understand that PAE is now actively considering funding options for the Gillman Yards pathway. If funding bids prove successful it is hoped that a new 'formalised' path from McNicol Tce - the current end of the paved pathway - through to Florence Tce, will be built in the 2025/26 financial year and then finished as far as the Cleveland/Railway Tce junction (and connection to the Rosewater Loop) in the following year.

Completion by Council of this 1st 'Gillman' stage will provide significant

new linkages for residents to the Port CBD's services and the Greenway. It must also provide additional encouragement for State Government to fund the more challenging Rosewater Loop project, especially given the growing interest of local residents in its funding and development. The PortBUG will continue to support the project with Council, State Government and the local community!

The State Government has recently launched an *Urban Greening Strategy for Metropolitan Adelaide*.

You can view and download the strategy <u>here</u>. Here are the 6 priority areas for action, included in the strategy:

- Cooler, greener and healthier
 development: Facilitating good design
 outcomes for development that protect
 existing trees and provide sufficient space for
 new urban greening.
- Government leading by example: The role of state and local government in driving better greening outcomes and to show leadership in this space through trialling new ideas, commissioning research and implementing innovative solutions for greening the land that they own and manage.
- 3. **Building nature back in:** Protecting and improving biodiversity in urban environments both on public and private land.
- Future-proofing our urban forest: Making sure our urban greenery is resilient to the impacts of climate change through increasing diversity of plantings, diversity within species and ensuring adequate water supply.
- 5. Improving greening equity: Making sure that all residents across metropolitan Adelaide have access to urban green spaces and the benefits they provide from a cooling, productivity and health and wellbeing view.
- Scaling up impact by working together: Different government and nongovernment organisations working together to enable greening action to happen at a metropolitan scale and have collective impact.
