
an update from Greening Rosewater Loop

Walking the Loop

Did you know you can take a walk around the loop in 10,000 steps? This is good news for people interested in increasing or maintaining their daily fitness levels. It's also good news for people thinking about making personal changes by starting to walk outside a little more on a level surface in their local neighbourhood with freshly planted natives to enjoy.

The loop is a great place to walk your dog as well with some shady places and safe off-lead opportunities which afford long sight views. This enables dog owners to predict potential safety issues or hazards if you have a nervous or anxious pet. (There is a pet stop with a bin and fresh doggy bags at the Newcastle Street Crossing).

The 10,000-step walk is mapped out below, but you can walk as much or as little as you need. So, pack a pet, find a friend or just get out there to watch your changing neighbourhood.
